

Dear friends,

As you know, I have recently completed the Manchester half marathon. It was a memorable sight, seeing the massed rank of runners assembled for the race. A select band run seriously. They are 'the elite runners'. They strive to beat the other competitors after months of punishing training, but the majority just take part simple for the 'fun', frequently running to raise much needed funds for charity. Far from competing with each other, they run together, the race being a shared experience undertaken in a spirit of unity – like Steph running with me, encouraging me all the way. In addition, the crowds are there to offer support. People cheer and shout encouragement as you run along the route. Children line some of the streets with bowls of jelly babies and slices of orange. High 5's are the order of the day – in fact the children had their own competition to see how many high fives they could get,

The same holds true in terms of faith. Our race is not one in which we strive to outdo each other. Rather, we participate alongside a great number of saints, past, present and future, from whom we can draw encouragement and inspiration, and pass them on in turn.

This time in the church's year is known as the 'Kingdom Season'. It includes 'All Saint's Day', 'All Soul's Day' and 'Remembrance Sunday'. On each of these days we remember and reflect on those who have gone before us in terms of our faith – the saints. We reflect on and remember our loved ones who are no longer with us but have supported and encouraged on our life journey – All Souls. On Remembrance Sunday we reflect on those who have given their lives for their country and have inspired courage and bravery. We give thanks to those who have gone before us, those who run with us now and those who will follow us.

We will struggle to run the race on our own, for it is a marathon, not a sprint and we hold onto the knowledge that we are part of something bigger than ourselves, part of a great company engaged in the same undertaking, serving God and our neighbours.

In the words of the letter to the Hebrew's, *'so then, we are surrounded by so great a crowd of witnesses, let us discard everything that encumbers us and the sin that clings to us so closely, and let us run with the perseverance the race set before us, looking to Jesus, the beginning and end of our faith.'*

Let us particularly remember during this Kingdom Season all those who have encouraged us in our faith journey and strive to pass on the same inspiration and encouragement to others.

Calling Angel-Makers

Deborah would like to give each child attending the Christmas Services an Angel.

If you can Knit, Crochet or Sew your help would be appreciated. The Angels need to be between 6" to 10" in size, they can be of any design.

Think outside the sink!

Water is a precious commodity; life would not be possible without it. Looking out of the window in November you would be forgiven for thinking that we have plenty of water in the UK, but in fact Manchester gets less rain than Milan or Sydney. In spite of the heavy rain of recent times, the water supply in England remains under long-term threat.



Tips to save water

There are simple ways to cut consumption:

- Do you have a water meter? This helps us stay aware of how much we are using, and rewards us for using less by cutting water bills;
- Check for leaks on pipes and taps. If you do have a water meter, turn off all the taps and the main stop valve, where the water enters the

building. Take two readings a couple of minutes apart. If there is any change in the reading you may have a leak;

- Fix leaking taps and make sure they are fully turned off.
- Lag your pipes. This saves on your heating bills, and prevents burst pipes in winter. But don't insulate a loft floor underneath your water tank – it may freeze;
- Save both water and electricity by only boiling as much water as you need, whilst making sure the electric heating element is fully covered;
- Make sure sinks have plugs and use a bowl to wash up;
- When replacing your washing machine or dishwasher, choose the most efficient type. Run them full but not over-full;
- Collecting rainwater in a water butt, and use it for the garden.

If we don't learn to conserve, we'll all be fish out of the water, and You Know the Result!

STEWARDSHIP NEWS

The Finance and Stewardship Committee would like to thank all members of the Church family who have responded generously to the appeal for an increase in Planned Giving. So far there has been an annual increase of 7.44% amounting to £2670.00 from 21% of all regular donors. Any further offers to increase giving will be welcome so that we can budget the ongoing cost of two churches serving the local community.

For all who pay Income Tax, please ensure that your giving is Gift Aided as it is increased by 25%. Our last reclaim amounted to £4900.00, a welcome addition to our income!

Plate Collections at festivals or special events are proving a success. Our Saint Margaret's Gift Day collection amounted to £571.00 (excluding Gift Aid. Donations from Baptisms Weddings and Funerals appear to be increasing.

The change from weekly to monthly collection envelopes introduced in July has been well accepted and will be reviewed later in the year.

Finally, Members of the Committee would like to thank the congregation for all that they contribute to our churches both financially and in terms of time, skills and talents.

May there someday, someday be love.
May there someday, someday be happiness.
I believe, I believe, I believe.



These incredibly moving words were set to music by Stuart Overington, SFP tutor and MD with the Halle family of choirs. He composed for four voice parts singing acapella, gradually building from a solo voice through to richly textured and hopeful climax at the end. When I sang it last year, I was accompanied by Tom, who played the alto, tenor and bass parts on the piano. This year, Maggie's Music Makers have been working hard learning to sing in two-part harmony, with Tom playing the tenor and bass parts on the piano. If it is ready, you'll hear it on Remembrance Sunday.

Community Christmas Cards

This article was first published in the December 2018 issue of this magazine. Here it is again, as a reminder of our stewardship responsibilities to protect our planet.



At this time of year countless charities, companies and other organisations try to boost their coffers by persuading people like you and me to buy their Christmas cards. We will spend good money on such cards. (Personally, I will only buy “charity” cards.) I know that it takes me a good few hours to write my cards, guided by my book detailing who I sent to last year, who sent to me, whether to include a “round robin” annual letter, sometimes

signing on behalf of husband and family, sometimes parenting them with a stack for them to sign in person. Next follows a trip to the post office to buy UK, Europe and USA stamps. I always miss the USA posting date, but nevertheless the cards seem to get there on time.

As incoming cards are delivered by the postie, I Blu-Tak them to the beams in the living room. I save the stamps for the leprosy mission, shred the part of the envelope bearing our address, and the rest goes into the general waste. After all, envelopes cannot be accepted for recycling.

In January (sometimes February, and on occasion March) I spend an evening updating my Christmas card log and slicing the cards in half. Those with blank space are put in a basket in the kitchen for use as shopping lists. The rest goes into the recycling bag.

Don't get me wrong. I love Christmas cards and the messages they convey. I look forward to receiving those annual letters from friends of long ago. But I have nagging doubts about the "eco-ethics" of so much paper and card being circulated and ultimately thrown away.

There has to be a better way.

Your parish Eco Group has a suggestion. What if we each give one card addressed to the entire Church Family? What if these cards are displayed in our churches for the congregations to see and read? Our festive wishes and blessings would automatically be extended to those at services we don't usually attend as well as those we see in church each week. Our churches would look even more beautiful. The amount of time, money, paper and card expended at this time would be dramatically cut. Our little bit of Mother Earth would heave a little sigh of relief.

No one is obliged to do this. If you still wish to write individual Christmas cards, then please do. If anyone is gracious enough to send one to me - even after reading this article! - then I will be truly grateful. But please do not be offended that you do not receive an individual card from me in return. I will be sending one Community Christmas Card to the entire Church Family - which includes you!

Do you enjoy singing but wish you knew the hymns better? We meet for weekly singing practices every Wednesday in church from 5.30-6.30pm.



